#### **GUIDE DOGS FOR THE BLIND**

One of the major projects undertaken by Lions worldwide is to provide guide dogs for the blind. In various countries Lions support this great project by donating funds to the various centres which train dogs.

One such centre is in Limbiate near Milan in Italy run on a professional basis training dogs not only for those in need in Italy but also for other countries. The Centre Director is Lion Profs. Giovanni Fossati, member of Lions Club Rho. Lion Giovanni has a staff of fifteen to train the dogs.

The idea of having such a centre in Italy was mooted by a military pilot who served in the Second World War and who lost his sight in an accident. From humble beginnings the centre is now fully established. It moved to Limbiate in the province of Milano occupying an area of 25000 square metres. Besides the Director the centre employs 15 persons who train doges from the time they are brought to the centre as puppies. The training of a guide dog takes about six months and costs approximately Euro 25000 by the time the dog can be handed over to the person in need of a guide dog. The cost also includes the stay of the person individual who would be receiving the guide dog while he is at the Centre for training.

In March 1966 the then President of the Italian Republic decreed the centre as "Ente Morale". As a result, the centre was able to obtain public funds for its day-to-day operations. However, these funds are not enough, hence the centre obtains other funds through donations made by various entities. 47% of these donations come from Lions Clubs in Multiple District 108 ITALY. Most of the Italian Lions Clubs make an annual donation thereby making it possible for the Centre to continue its noble work.

Three years a number of Lions Sliema had the opportunity to visit the Centre and were taken around the Centre by Profs. Fossati who explained in detail who a dog is trained.

Lions Club Sliema has made an agreement with the Centre to obtain a dog for a blind person in Malta. This person has already been to Limbiate for training. It is hoped that the guide dog will be in Malta by this summer. Lion Treasurer Alex Arena is coordinator of this project and has stated that the dog should be in Malta early in the summer months.
